TOPIC: World War 2

Religious Education

- I can make clear links between Bible stories studied and the importance of love and life in the world today.

- Write a non-chronological report about the Second World War making links to ICT for research.
 Write a diary entry from the perspective of Anne Frank focusing on the use of 1st person
- and links to thoughts and feelings.
 Write a war time recipe, focusing on instructional writing and use of imperative verbs.
