Promoting Emotional Health and Well-being Through Process Art

Art is a perfect way to help support children's well-being and emotional health.

Process art is art where the end product is not the main focus. The process of making is the most important part. It is a way to create without being inhibited or worried that the end product isn't just right! It is imaginative and experimental, and nothing that is produced is wrong. Often the end results are magnificent pieces of art in their own right! Process art stimulates children and gives them the opportunity to respond imaginatively and enthusiastically to the given resources.

UKS2 Process Art Activity



Wrap a Rock'

Resources:

A palm size pebble

String, threads, wool of different colours

Thin strips of ribbon or fabric



Bits of wire (if you have any) REMIND the children to be careful with this!

Beads and buttons

Give the Children a range of resources from the above list (you do not need to have them all, these are some ideas) and tell the Children the activity is Called wrap a rock.... Off they go and get Creative!

Some examples to help you...

My child was ... Calm, excited, frustrated, well-motivated, enthusiastic, lost, didn't know where to start etc.

My child enjoyed the freedom this activity gave.

My child struggled with the fact that they didn't know what the 'end product' would look like.

My child loved the activity and spent a long time exploring the resources.

My child found this really tricky, they struggled to get going and needed lots of encouragement.

My child spent ... minutes on the activity.

The length of time a child spends on the activity will be different for each child, so try to allow them as much time as they want to explore and use the resources — they will know when they have finished!!!
